

## Connie Johnson


**Constance “Connie” N. Johnson** is an American politician and community advocate from Oklahoma. She served as a member of the Oklahoma State Senate, from 2005 to 2014, where she worked on issues including health, transportation, veterans’ affairs, and social justice.

In 2014, Johnson made history as the first African American woman in Oklahoma to be nominated by a major party for the U.S. Senate when she won the Democratic primary. She has also run for governor and remained active in civic and policy debates in the state.


